

Make existing employers more competitive:

Attract the next generation of skilled workers

16—34 year olds in 2009 compared to 2001:

- drove 23% fewer miles
- took 24% more bike trips
- walked to their destinations 16% more
- increased their transit miles by 40%

FY13 Amtrak service in New Hampshire:

Station	Boardings + Alightings
Dover	61,708
Durham-UNH	60,978
Exeter	101,543
Total:	224,229 or 614/day

 - workplace commuting




- energy costs

Bad roads increase trucking costs


New Hampshire Pavement Condition 1996-2017

- energy costs
 - action item: ask your state reps how they are voting on the various bills this session aimed at increasing the highway fund; demand a plan for sustainably funding road and bridge maintenance

 - transportation #1 GHG culprit in NH
 - Climate Change Action Plan

Climate Change Action Plan recommendations

- improve transit, Park & Ride
- expand bike/ped
- improve rail
- stable funding

Protect air and water quality

- reduce vehicle miles traveled
- promote compact, mixed use development

- growth that is shared equitably for those who don't drive
 - action item: protect vulnerable road users by supporting NH house bill 1485

Action items:

- put matching funds for community transportation in the next budget
- increase the highway fund now; demand a plan for sustainably funding roads and bridges in the future
- make transit and parking benefits equal and permanent: HR 2288 and S 1116
- protect vulnerable users with NH house bill 1485
