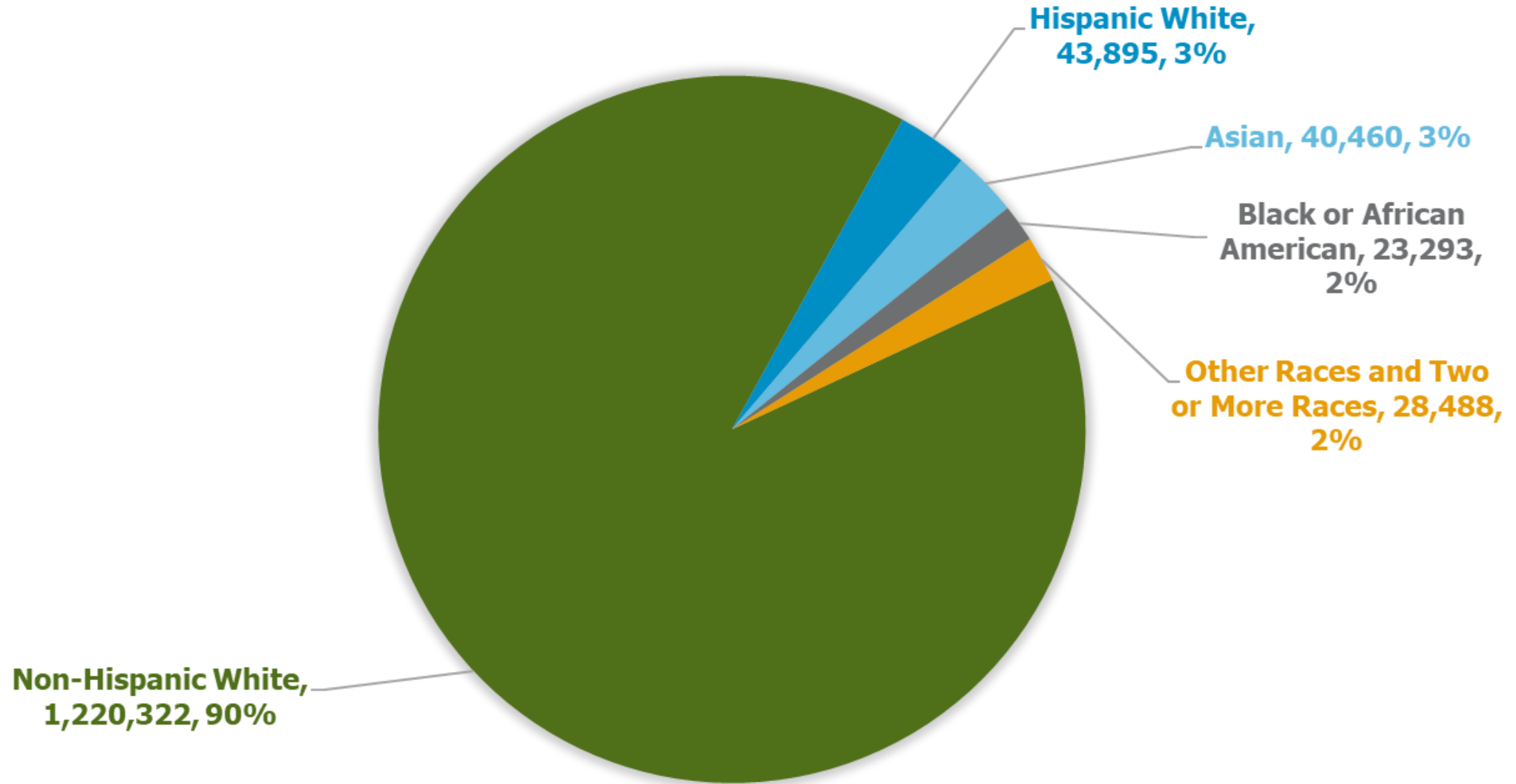
- Growth in the population of individuals identifying as a member of a racial and ethnic minority group in New Hampshire has supported the state's population growth, especially among children.
- Poverty rates are higher for racial and ethnic minority groups in New Hampshire than for non-Hispanic white residents. Granite Staters who are Hispanic, Latino, Black, or African American have lower personal and householder incomes, and about one in six Hispanic or Latino residents, and about one in five Black or African American residents, live in poverty.
- Child poverty is higher in Manchester and appears to be higher in Nashua when compared to the statewide rate. Nearly half of Hispanic or Latino Granite Staters and half of Black or African American Granite Staters live in these two cities.
- Health impacts from the 2019 novel coronavirus have been disproportionate on racial and ethnic minority groups in the state, which is likely related to more limited access to incomes and assets.

New Hampshire, Estimates for July 2018

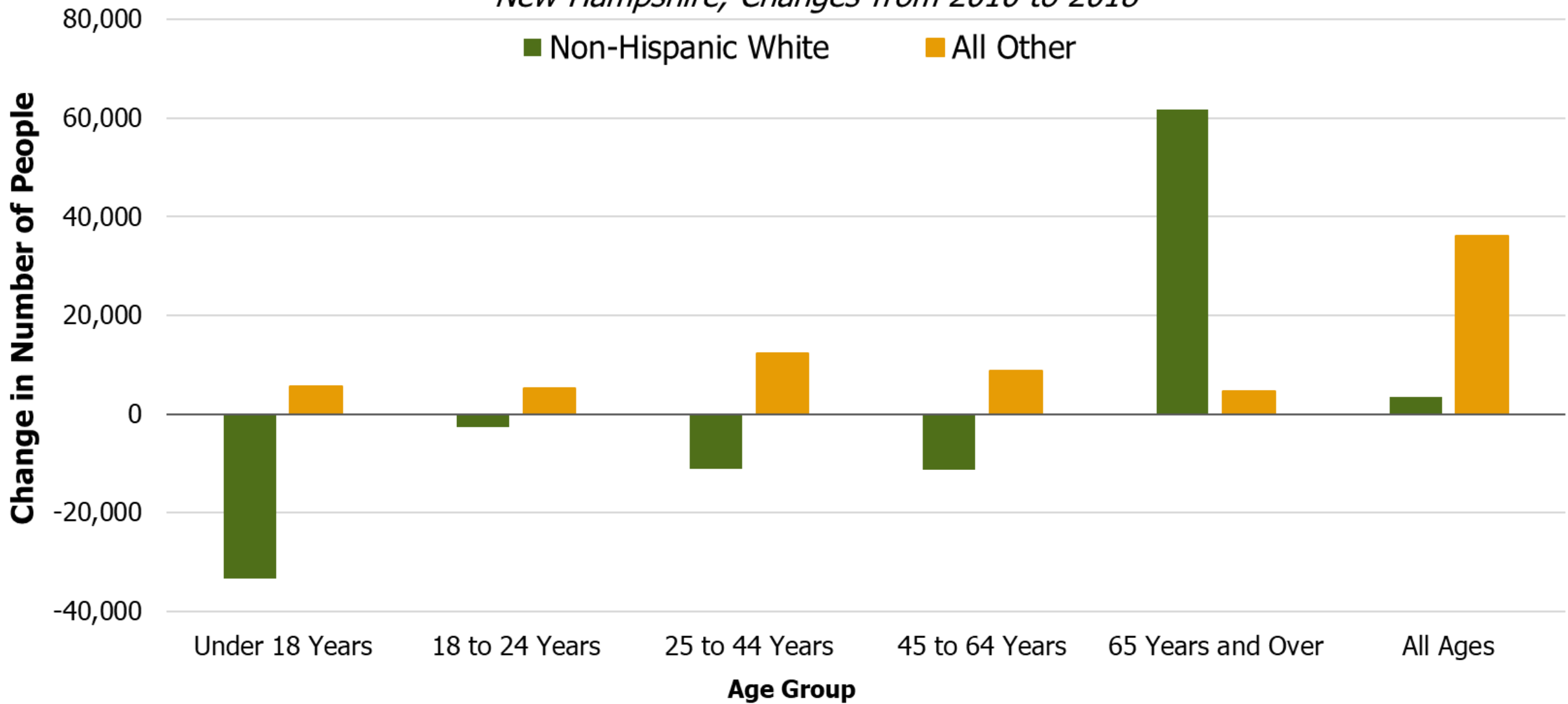

New Hampshire, Changes from 2010 to 2018

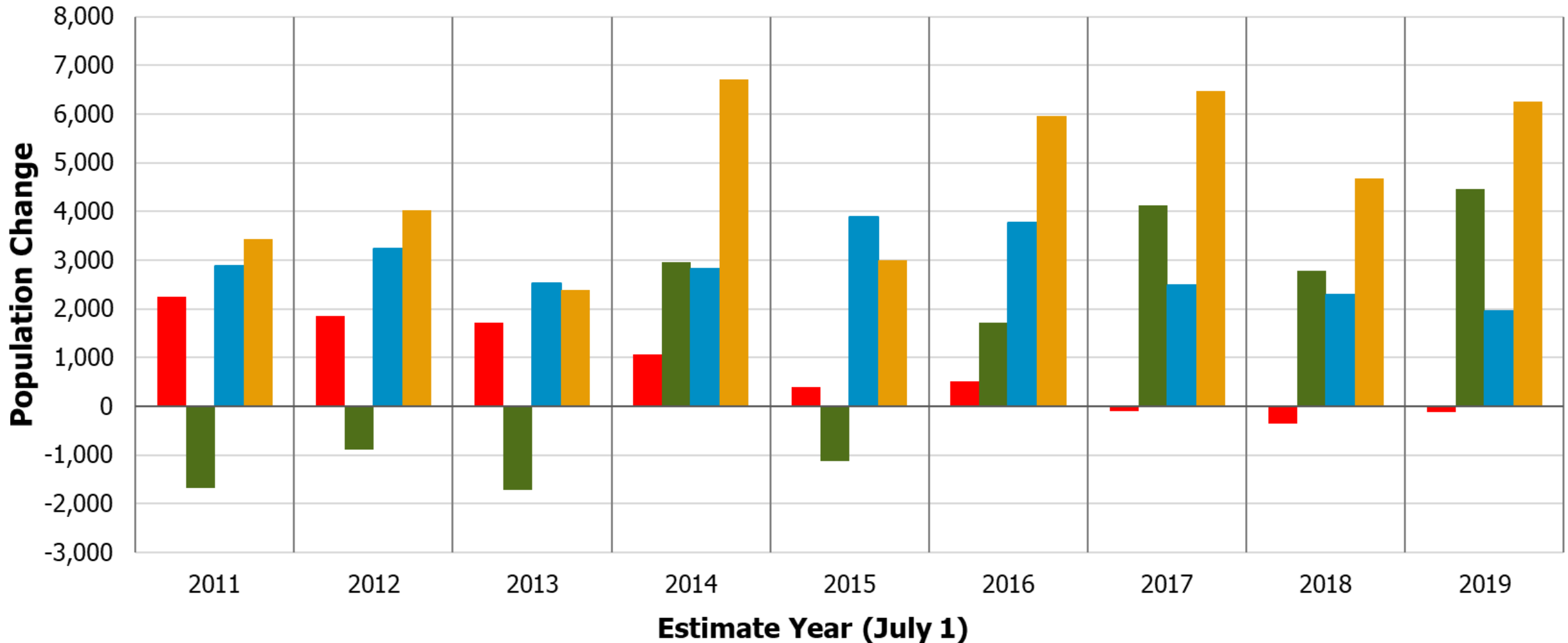

Estimates of Total and Natural Change, Net Domestic and International Migration

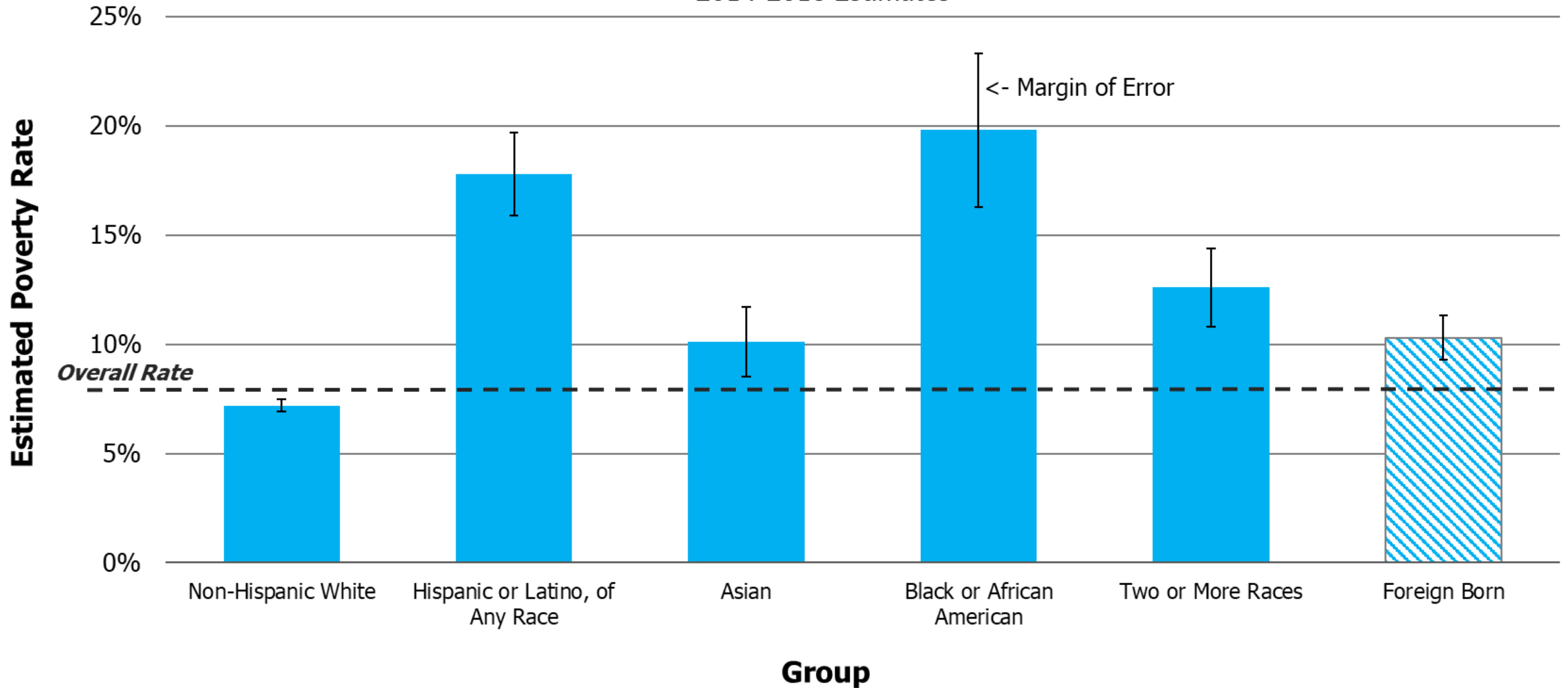
■ Natural Increase (Births Minus Deaths) ■ Net Domestic Migration ■ Net International Migration ■ Net Total Population Change

New Hampshire Poverty Rates by Group

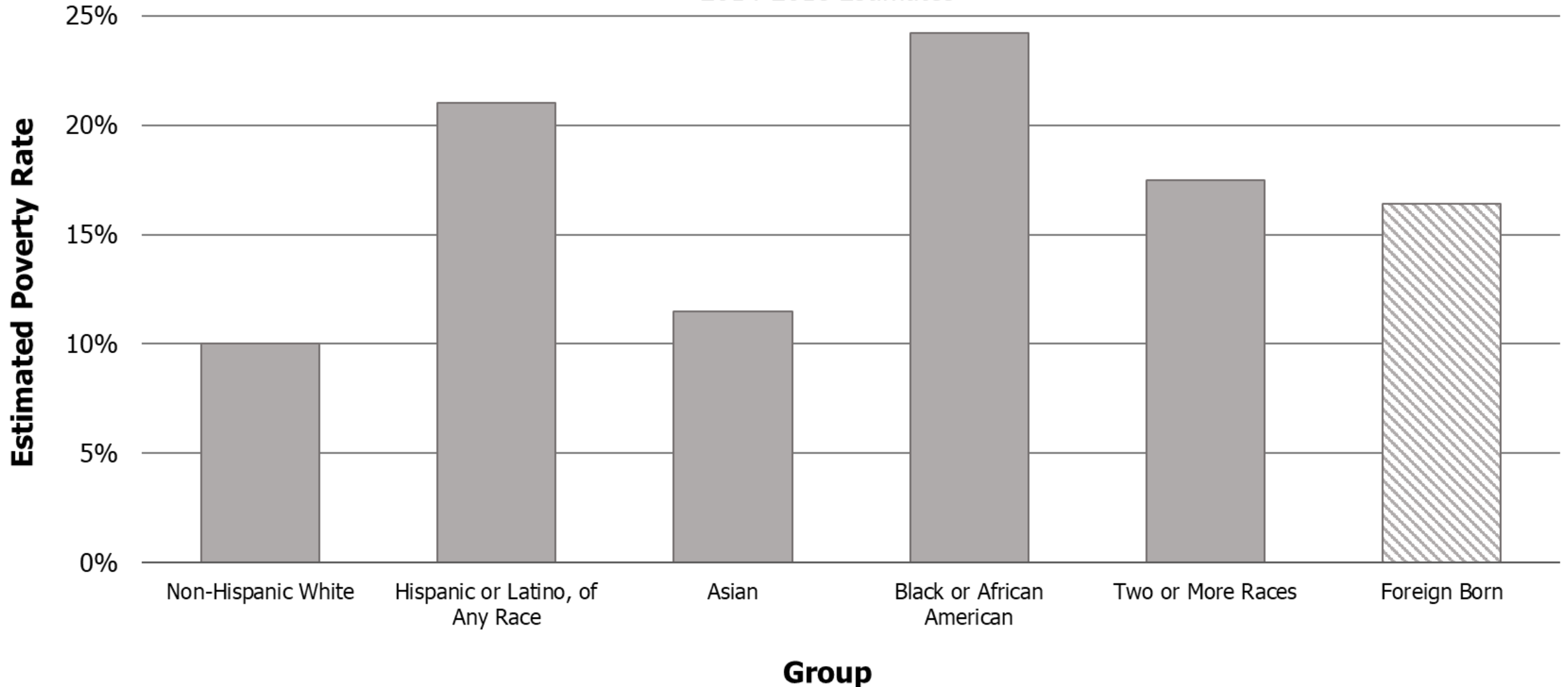

United States Poverty Rates by Group

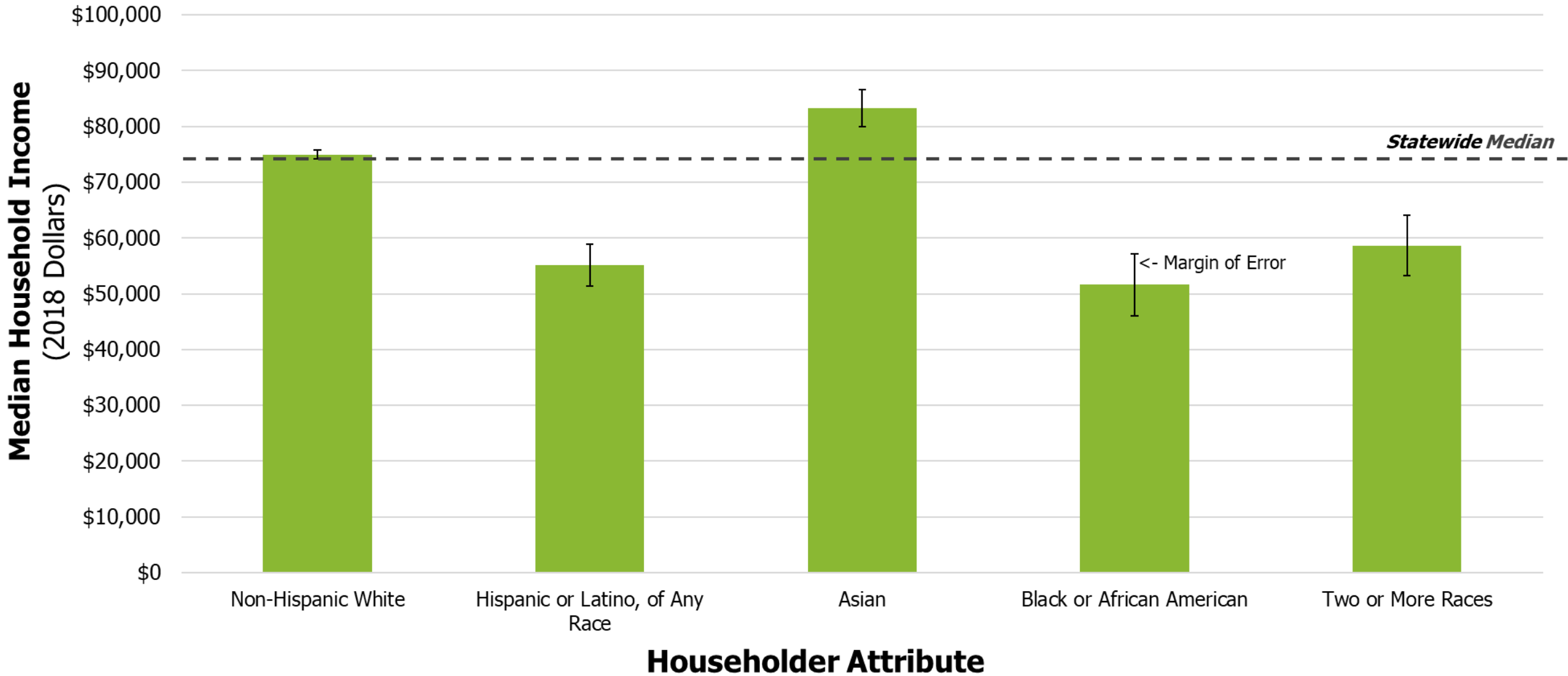

New Hampshire, Estimated for 2014-2018*

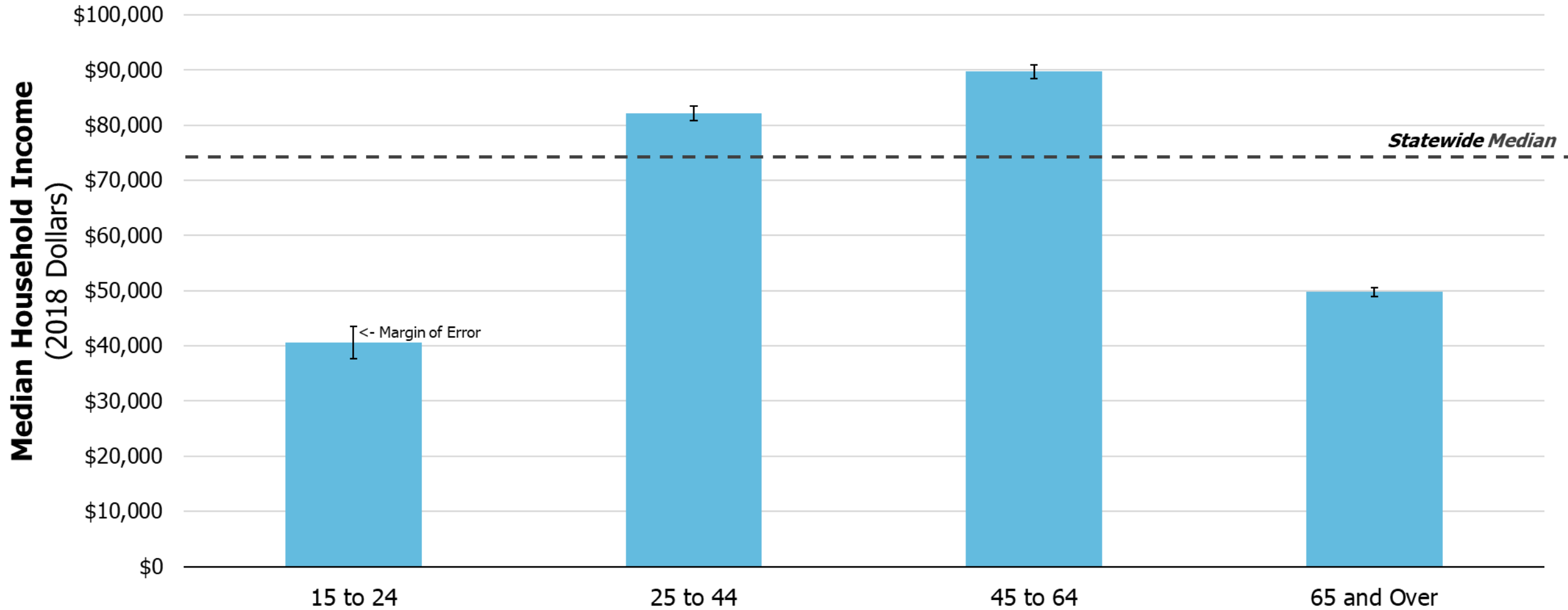

New Hampshire, Estimated for 2014-2018

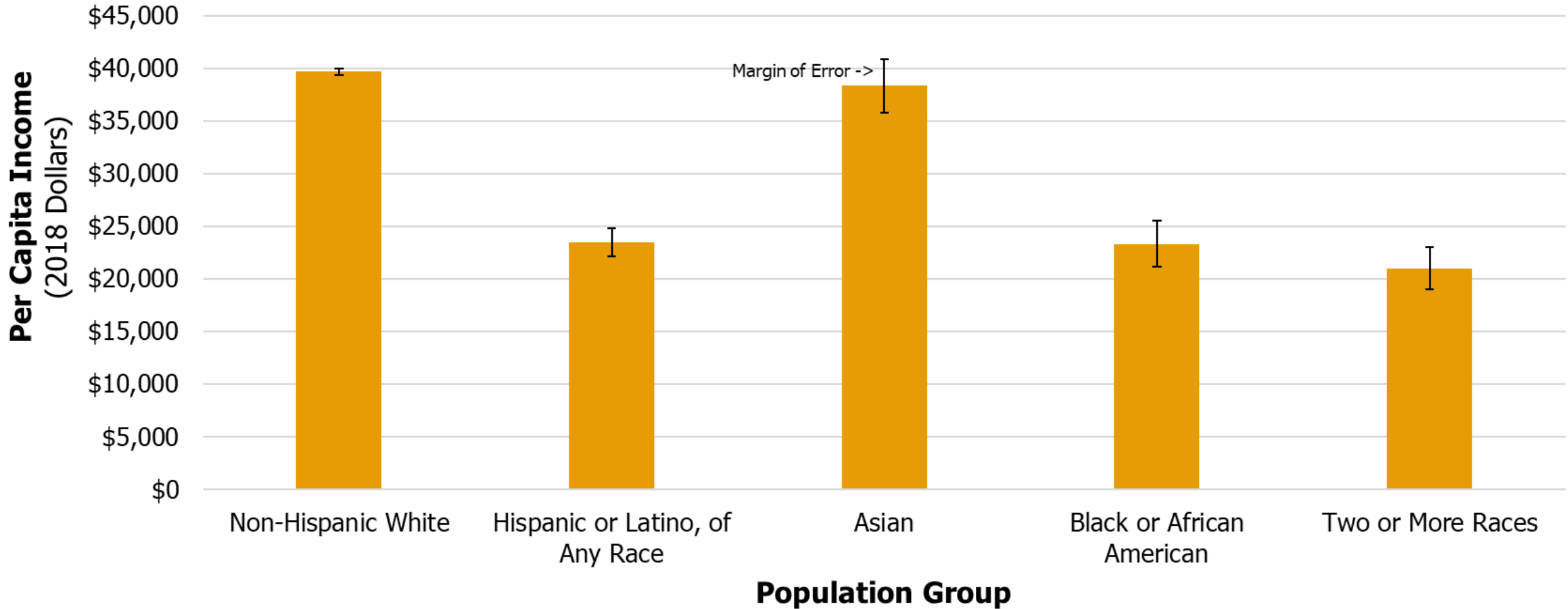


Householder Age in Years

Per Capita Income by Race and Ethnicity

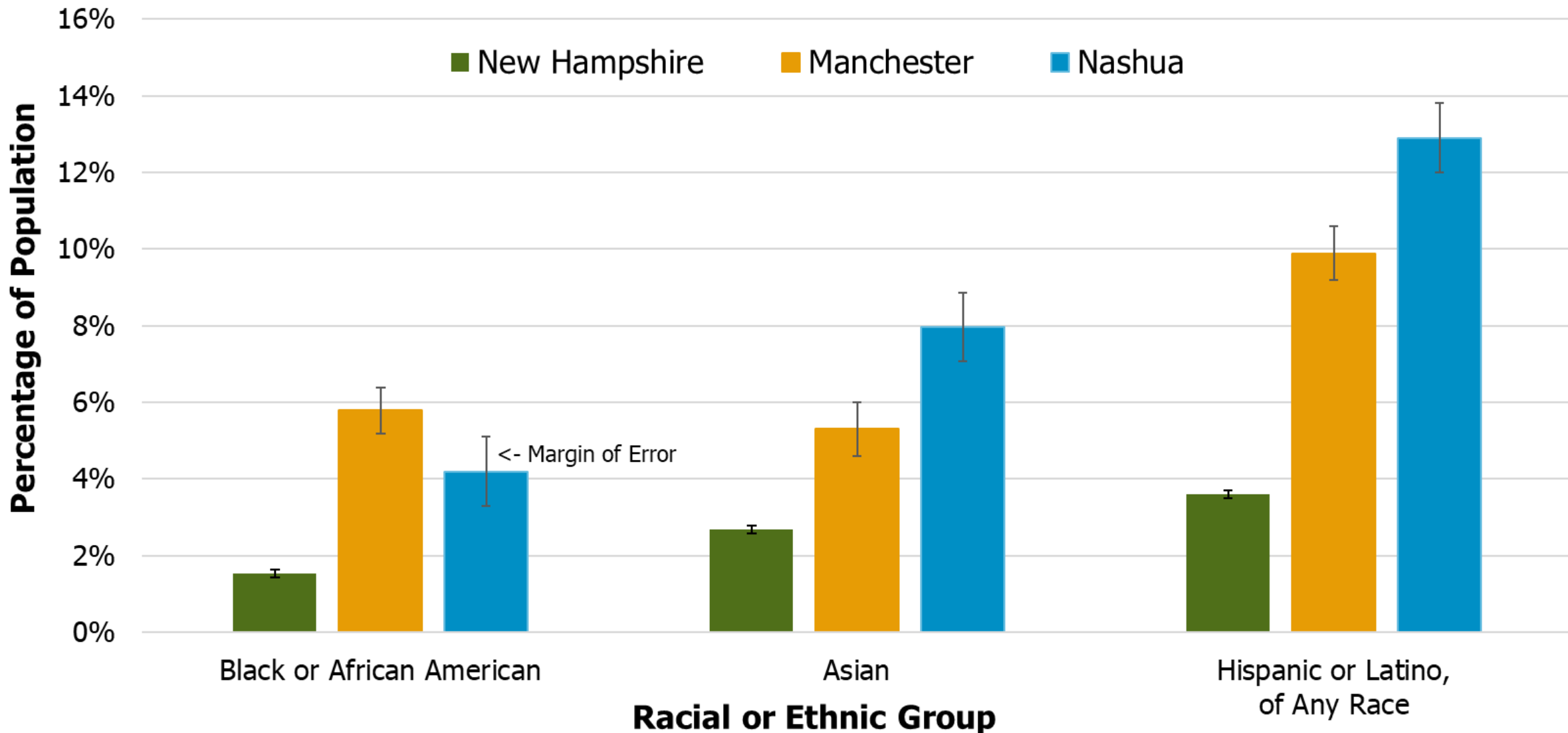
*New Hampshire, Averages Based on Aggregate Income,

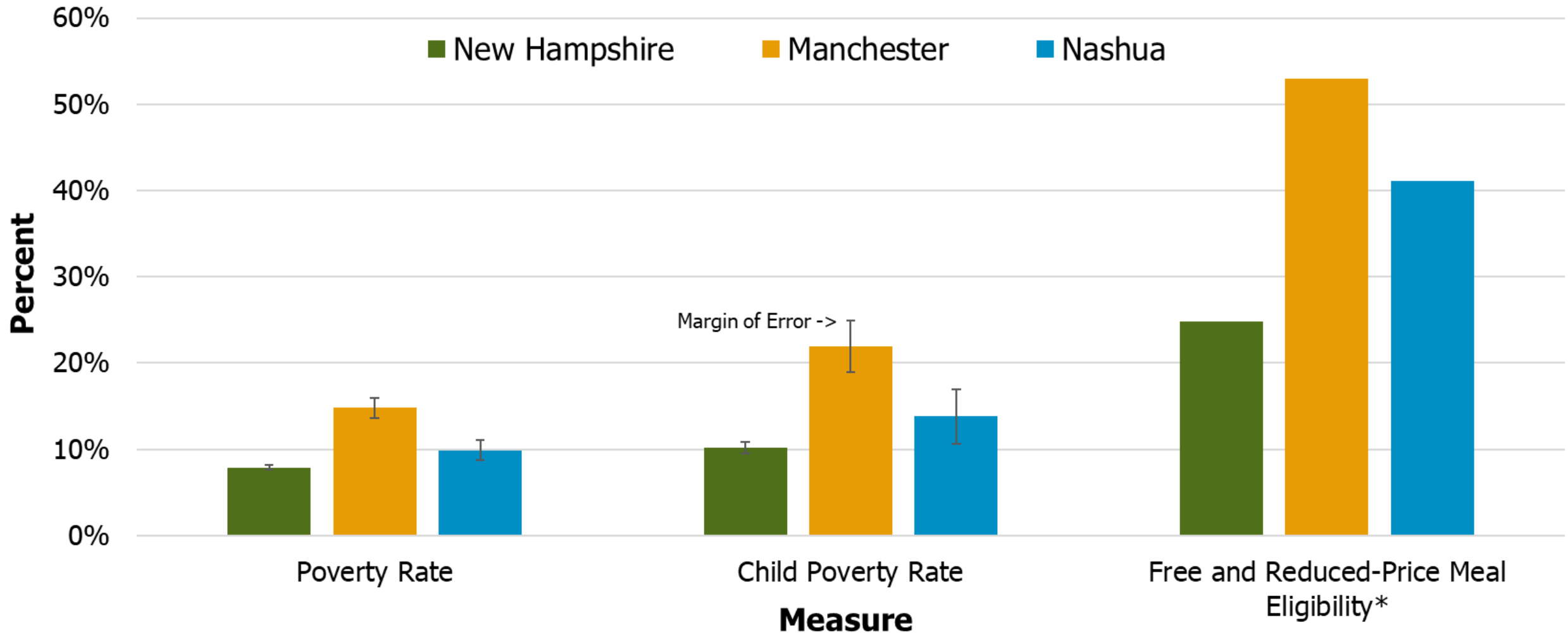
Percentage of Population by Racial or Ethnic Group

Poverty, Child Poverty, and Free/Reduced-Price Meal Eligibility

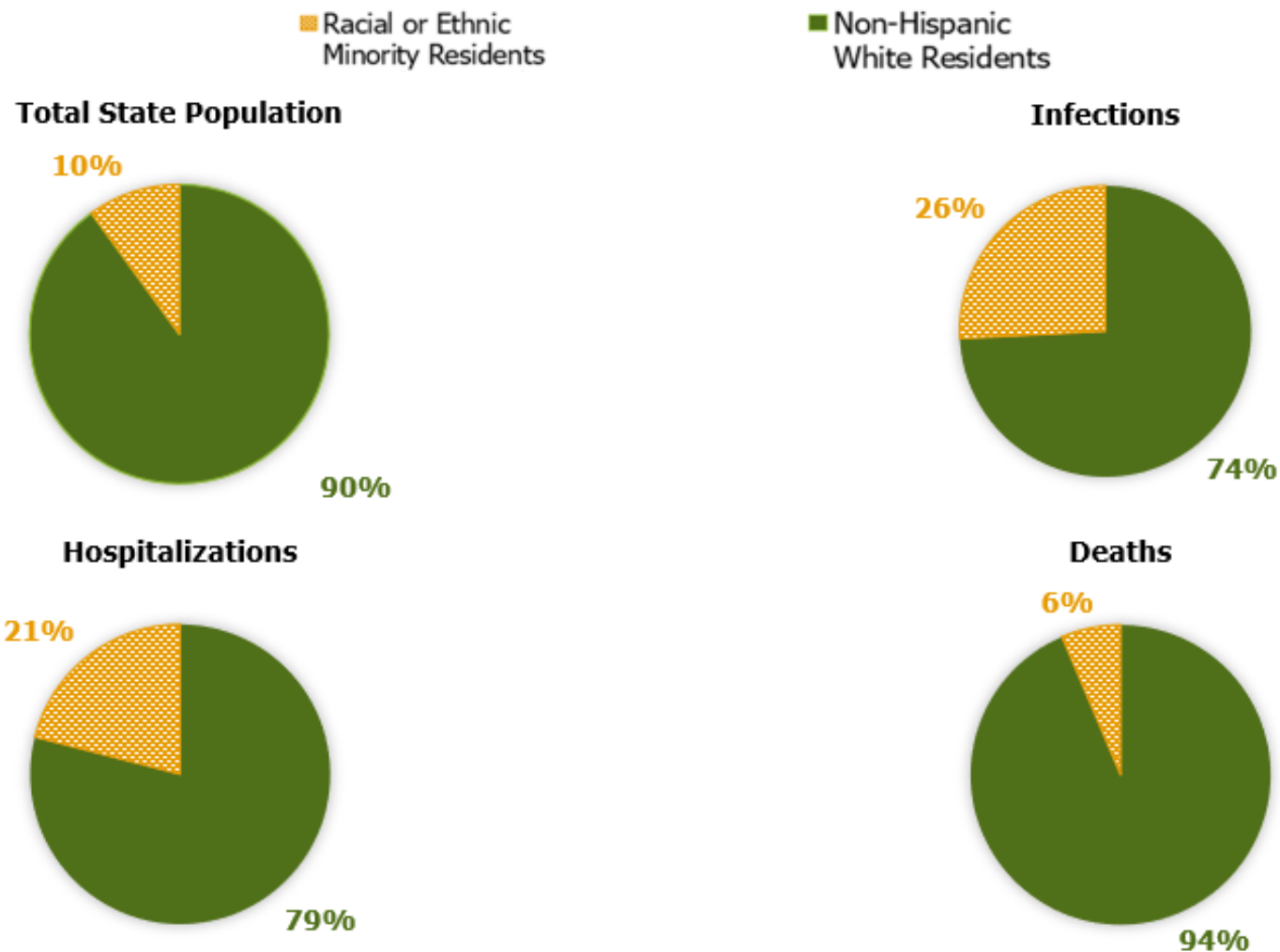
