

HOUSEHOLD INCOME DISTRIBUTION


ESTIMATED PERCENTAGE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE HOUSEHOLDS BY INCOME GROUP, 2019


POVERTY LEVELS BY GROUP OR ATTRIBUTE IN NEW HAMPSHIRE, 2015-2019

9% Child Poverty Rate for New Hampshire in 2015-2019



The people with the fewest resources going into the pandemic were the most likely to be directly affected.





INFECTIONS





PERCENT CHANGE IN EMPLOYMENT IN NEW HAMPSHIRE



NATIONAL EMPLOYMENT IMPACTS UNEVEN





We have an opportunity to support an inclusive, equitable, and sustainable recovery.

OPPORTUNITY AREAS TO SUPPORT A MORE INCLUSIVE RECOVERY

- Affordable Housing
- Economic Security and Financial Stability
- Health Care
- Child Care and Caregiving
- Education and Job Training
- Broadband

FEDERAL AND OTHER AID

Affordable Housing

- Approximately \$352 million in federal aid to New Hampshire for rental assistance since December 2020
- Funding for homeowner assistance
- Emergency housing vouchers for people at risk of homelessness

Economic Security and Financial Stability

- Expanded Child Tax Credit
- Expanded Earned Income Tax Credit for childless adults
- Boosts to food assistance
- Support for home heating, cooling, drinking water, and wastewater costs

FEDERAL AND OTHER AID

Health Care

- Recent federal bill temporarily enhances tax credits for people purchasing insurance on the individual health care marketplace
- Funding increase for Medicaid home and community services
- Federal aid related to COVID-19 testing, vaccine access, community health centers, mental health and substance misuse

Child Care and Caregiving

- Federal support to both child care providers (\$48 million to New Hampshire) and individuals with low incomes who need access to child care (\$30 million to New Hampshire)
- Tax credit for employers offering paid sick leave and family medical leave extended and expanded

FEDERAL AND OTHER AID

Education and Job Training

- Most recent aid: \$350.5 million to New Hampshire school districts, portion focused on learning loss during the pandemic
- For higher education, \$164.8 million to New Hampshire schools

Broadband

- Funding in several federal bills for connecting schools, libraries, families with low incomes, rural areas, underserved populations
- State previously deployed some flexible funding for broadband
- Additional flexible federal aid flowing to state, counties, and municipalities specifically can be used for broadband infrastructure
