









INVESTMENTS IN BEHAVIORAL HEALTH, NURSING HOMES, AND LONG-TERM CARE

- Adds \$30 million appropriation to construct a 24-bed forensic psychiatric hospital, \$6 million for new transitional housing beds and enhanced reimbursement rates for behavioral health patients, and \$8.2 million for community mental health mobile crisis units and stabilization services
- Adds \$21.4 million to increase funding for nursing homes by 5 percent, using General Fund and federal matching funds without added county funding obligations
- Provides at least a 5 percent rate increase for most services for Choices for Independence Medicaid waiver services for home and community-based care as an alternative to nursing homes
- Includes a \$22.6 million General Fund back-of-budget reduction to reduce positions at the DHHS, not known which service areas
- Contains provisions limiting certain reproductive health services





AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT RESOURCES FOR STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

- Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds:
 State (\$995M), counties (\$264M), and municipalities (\$198M)
 - Support pandemic response, public revenue, economic stabilization
 - Address systemic health, economic challenges contributing to unequal impacts
- Capital Projects Fund, critical investments in broadband, capital assets (\$122M to State of New Hampshire)
- Enhanced federal Medicaid funding for home and communitybased services (\$43M to State of New Hampshire)
- Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief, reopening schools and addressing pandemic learning loss (\$350M to New Hampshire K-12 schools)
