

SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF HOUSEHOLDS WITH LOW INCOMES OR IN POVERTY

- About 1 in 4 New Hampshire households had incomes below \$50,000 in 2023 data
- About 11 percent had incomes below \$25,000 in 2023
- Almost 16 percent had incomes at or above \$200,000
- Average New Hampshire household size was 2.39 people
- 2023 poverty thresholds were \$15,852 for a single person under 65, \$24,526 for a threeperson household with one child

NEW HAMPSHIRE HOUSEHOLDS BY INCOME GROUP, 2023





SPM POVERTY RATES BY AGE GROUP IN NEW HAMPSHIRE












- About half of 2023 renters paid 30% or more of income in rent and utilities, 1 in 4 paid more than 50%
- Median early 2024 rent and utilities for a two-bedroom unit in New Hampshire \$1,833 per month, 31% higher than early 2019
- Median household incomes for:
 - Renters: \$53,800
 - Homeowners: \$114,900
- Median single family house sale price rose 71% June 2019-June 2024, to \$538,000, could result in monthly bills over \$4,000 for median house

Child Care Tuition Prices for Center-Based and Family Child Care for Infants and Toddlers






EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATOR WAGES LOWER THAN MEDIAN FOR ALL JOB TYPES

HOURLY WAGE IN NEW HAMPSHIRE BY PERCENTILE, 2023





Hourly Wage Comparisons to the 2021-2023 Average, Counting All Income from Work





New Hampshire, Includes All Income from Work for Workers Over Age 15, 2019 Level = 100






MANY ADULTS CONTINUE TO REPORT USUAL EXPENSES ARE DIFFICULT TO AFFORD

Percentage Living in Households in Which It Has Been Somewhat or Very Difficult to Pay for Usual Household Expenses During the Last Seven Days






MANY GRANITE STATERS MAY BE LEAVING WORKFORCE IN COMING DECADE

NEW HAMPSHIRE POPULATION BY AGE GROUP




NEW HAMPSHIRE POPULATION PROJECTIONS BY AGE





MIGRATION CRITICAL TO STATE POPULATION GROWTH



POPULATION GROWTH IN NEW HAMPSHIRE BY SOURCE, 2010-2023 ESTIMATED TOTALS









Estimates of Annual Net Migration, from 2018 to 2022






MOST DOMESTIC OUTMIGRATION FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE TO SOUTHEASTERN STATES

KEY TAKEAWAYS

- Median household income rebounded in 2023 after falling behind inflation in 2022, about one in four households had less than \$50,000 in annual income in 2023
- Wages have increased relative to inflation, particularly for lower wages, compared to pre-COVID-19 estimates
- Poverty rates held steady by official measure in 2023, nearly 100,000 people were in poverty, including 20,000 children
- Accounting for tax credits, key aid, and regional housing costs shows large increase in poverty between 2021 and 2022
- Child care and housing costs are key drivers of family budgets
- Many workers may be leaving the labor force in coming decades, as more people enter traditional retirement ages
- In-migration has sustained population growth, and is helping state become more racially and ethnically diverse
