







Effective Tax Rate as a Share of Income by Income Group, 2024 Tax Laws Based on 2023 Income Levels*




Income Group as a Percentage of Taxpayers

EQUALIZED VALUATION PER PUPIL BY NEW HAMPSHIRE COMMUNITY, STATE FISCAL YEAR 2024






HIGHER EDUCATION FUNDING FROM THE NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE BUDGET




- New Hampshire had less funding for higher education per \$1,000 of personal income than any other state (FY 2024)
- New Hampshire had the lowest amount of state dollars appropriated by full-time equivalent student in the country (FY 2022)
- Highest average debt in country among students graduating from New Hampshire institutions with debt (Class of 2020)
