



MEDICAID SERVICES DIVISION CHANGES

CHANGE IN MEDICAID FUNDING BY FUNDING TYPE

MEDICAID REDUCTIONS LARGELY DUE TO LOWER HOSPITAL UNCOMPENSATED CARE FUNDING

- Total reduction of \$200.5 million in General Funds from current State Fiscal Years (SFYs) 2024-2025 to Governor's proposed SFYs 2026-2027, accounting for both years in each State Budget
- \$133.1 million of that total is in the Medicaid managed care line
- Total appropriations for Medicaid managed care are higher (\$291.1 million, 19.0 percent), but General Funds are substantially lower while Other Funds increased
 - o More Medicaid Enhancement Tax revenues flowing to the Medicaid managed care lines
- Uncompensated care funding pool for hospitals:
 - o SFY 2024 actual expenditures: \$243.2 million
 - SFY 2026 Governor's proposal: \$88.4 million
- Lower uncompensated care payments allows more Medicaid Enhancement Tax revenue to offset more General Fund revenue for Medicaid match
- Changes to these lines could impact General Fund appropriations




PROPOSED COST SHARING FOR MEDICIAID ENROLLEES AND OTHER CHANGES

- Federal waiver to establish premiums among Granite Advantage Program for enrollees over
 100 percent of the federal poverty guidelines
 - Estimated \$12.0 million towards the Granite Advantage Healthcare Trust Fund for SFY 2027
- Premiums also established for Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP); households above 255 percent of the federal poverty guidelines
 - CHIP premiums factored into projected General Fund revenue; \$3.3 million for SFY 2026 and \$11.0 million for SFY 2027
- Premiums limited to 5 percent of household's income, with cost restrictions for certain services
- Increased prescription drug cost shares, from \$1-2 to \$4
 - Estimated \$750,000 each year of biennium to General Fund
- State plan amendments made for CHIP premiums and prescription cost shares by January 2026, Medicaid waiver for Granite Advantage premiums by July 2026
- Expiration of temporary Medicaid waivers associated with public health emergency; return to normal eligibility redeterminations in place prior to pandemic


PROPOSED CHANGES RELATED TO MENTAL HEALTH FUNDING

- Increase for Bureau of Mental Health Services; additional \$12 million in allocations across proposed biennium, \$6 million each year, to support uncompensated care at community mental health centers
- Decrease of \$10.9 million in Children's Behavioral Health Bureau between SFY 2025 adjusted authorized amount and SFY 2026 in the Governor's proposal
 - Reorganization of funds into other departments
 - Children's Behavioral Health Resource Center not funded under proposal
- Funding for Bureau of Drug and Alcohol Services remain relatively flat; declines among Recovery Friendly Workplace Initiative
- Hampsted Hospital removed from State Budget following approved lease and operational change to Dartmouth Health
- Increase of \$7.3 million in allocations for New Hampshire Hospital, between adjusted authorized amount for SFY 2025 and proposed for SFY 2026

ADDITIONAL HOUSING INVESTMENTS BY BUDGET BIENNIUM








FUNDING FOR HEALTH CENTER SUPPORT VARIED IN GOVERNOR'S PROPOSAL

- State Loan Repayment Program (SLRP) helping to recruit and retain health care professionals in rural and medically underserved areas
 - Total funding remained relatively flat between the adjusted authorized amount for SFY 2025 and the proposed amount for SFY 2026
- Maternal and Child Health Title V Block Grant, also formerly known as "primary care contracts," providing funding to health centers to support preventive care
 - Total funding declined between the adjusted authorized amount for SFY 2025 (\$6.0 million) and the proposed amount for SFY 2026 (\$5.6 million)
 - Funding towards contracts for program services increased slightly between SFY 2025 (\$4.5 million) and SFY 2026 (\$4.7 million)

FEDERAL FUNDING FOR NEW HAMPSHIRE MEDICAID

- Medicaid, including all parts of the program, is the largest program the State operates (estimated \$2.6 billion in SFY 2025)
- Federal funds for Medicaid was the single largest source of revenue to the State in SFY 2024 (\$1.4 billion)
- Several federal proposals under consideration would substantially change Medicaid funding to states
- Two measurable proposals, implemented together, would have cost the State of New Hampshire about \$493 million more in SFY 2025 to keep the same level of service

Current Federal Law Provides a Minimum 50 Percent Match for State Medicaid Programs, Otherwise Adjusted by Formula Based on State Per Capita Income





KEY TAKEAWAYS

- Governor's budget proposes changes to Medicaid and other assistance programs, including adding Medicaid premiums and copayments, increasing funding for mental health services and housing shelter supports, and nursing facilities
- Proposal includes proposed decreases in appropriations for Choices for Independence Medicaid waiver services and uncompensated care payments to hospitals
- Medicaid premiums would be for Granite Advantage and Children's Health Insurance Program enrollees with higher incomes
- Several federal changes could substantially reduce Medicaid funding to the State, trigger the end of some services without policy adjustments
- House revenue estimates will prompt significant funding reductions
 relative to Governor's proposal
