

NEW HAMPSHIRE POPULATION BY AGE GROUP




NEW HAMPSHIRE'S LABOR FORCE BY AGE IN YEARS, 2024











from April 1, 2020 to July 1, 2024*









- Renter median household income: \$54,000



















ACCESS TO VEHICLES FOR NEW HAMPSHIRE HOMEOWNER HOUSEHOLDS







NEW HAMPSHIRE HOUSEHOLDS BY INCOME GROUP, 2023



- Median income for all household sizes was about \$97,000, according to data collected during 2023
- Average New Hampshire household size was 2.39 people during 2023
- Almost 16 percent had incomes at or above \$200,000 in 2023
- About 1 in 4 New Hampshire households had incomes below \$50,000 in 2023 data
- About 11 percent had incomes below \$25,000 in 2023
- 2023 poverty thresholds were \$15,852 for a single person under 65, \$24,526 for a three-person household with one child
- About 98,000 Granite Staters (7.2 percent) were in poverty during 2023




MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOMES HIGHER CLOSER TO METROPOLITAN BOSTON

- Pattern of median household incomes has changed slightly since COVID-19 pandemic, but not dramatically
- Fewer communities with lower-than-statewide median incomes in southeast
- More communities with higher-than-statewide median household incomes in Lakes Region in most recent data
- Strafford Region variation north-to-south and between larger municipalities







LABOR FORCE AND EMPLOYMENT AMONG NEW HAMPSHIRE RESIDENTS



LABOR FORCE AND EMPLOYMENT AMONG STRAFFORD COUNTY RESIDENTS



LABOR FORCE SHORTAGE, ALTHOUGH POST-PANDEMIC SHORTAGE MAY BE EASING


NUMBER OF JOB OPENINGS PER NEW HAMPSHIRE RESIDENT

FEDERAL AND STATE BUDGET CONSIDERATIONS

- Federal assistance and contracts to New Hampshire obligated during Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2024 totaled more than \$14.8 billion, equivalent to about 12.3 percent of entire New Hampshire Gross State Product
- Included \$844.2 million in FFY 2024 for activities specifically identified as in Strafford County, including Social Security, Veterans' benefits, education, public housing, energy, food, agriculture, and science research
- FFY 2022 data accounting for all federal spending (benefits directly provided, employment, internal spending, etc.) was \$21.8 billion, equivalent of about 21 percent of size of state's economy in 2022
- State Budget proposal includes status quo policies relative to existing municipal revenue sharing, small aggregate increase to education funding to school districts that primarily shifts distribution of aid

KEY TAKEAWAYS

- New Hampshire's demographics suggest slower future workforce growth, and increased reliance on migration, with a headwind of housing costs
- Recent labor force growth and more limited constraints may be temporary
- Household budgets constrained by increasing costs for housing, transportation, child care, and food
- Incomes for many households fall short of cost-of-living estimates, and households have limited assets following increase after COVID-19 pandemic
- Resources vary considerably by community, including in different regions of the state and within regions
- Economic changes since the pandemic and potentially significant policy changes could have ongoing impacts down to local level
