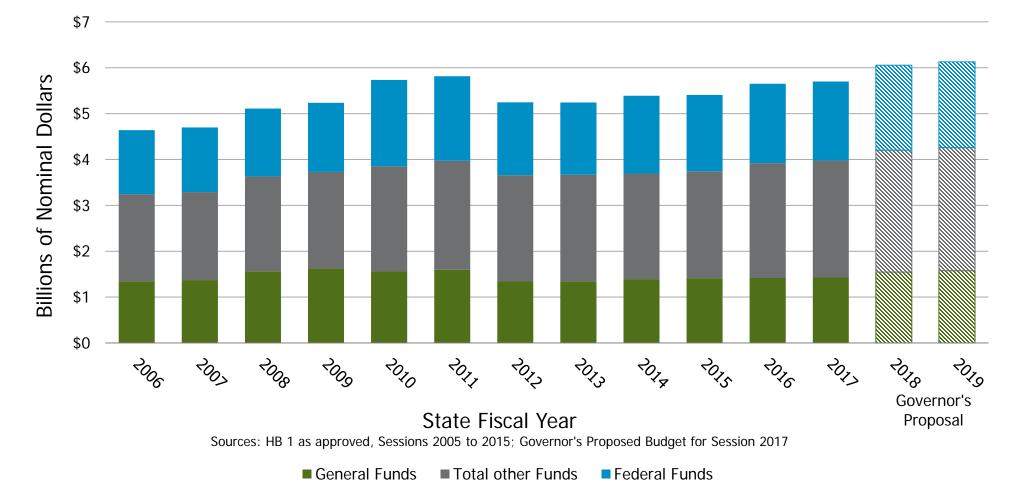

#### The Basics of the Budget

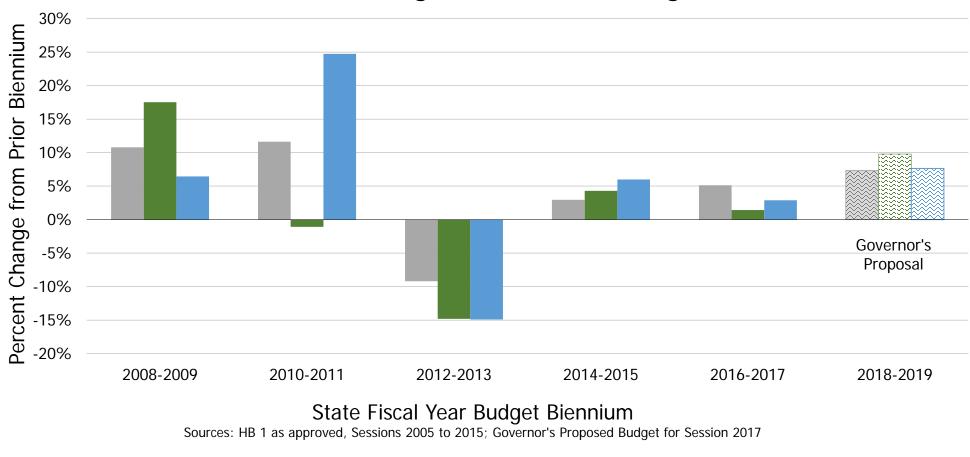
- Biennial operating budget
  - Pays for two State fiscal years of State operating expenses
  - State fiscal year 2017: July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017
  - Includes most State spending
- Comprised of two separate pieces of legislation
  - House Bill 1 or "HB 1": the line-item appropriations, amount of money in each component of state programs
  - House Bill 2 or "HB 2": the companion or "trailer" bill with policy changes
- Constructed in five phases
- Current operating budget \$11.4 billion for two years

# **Overall Budget: Changes Across Biennia**



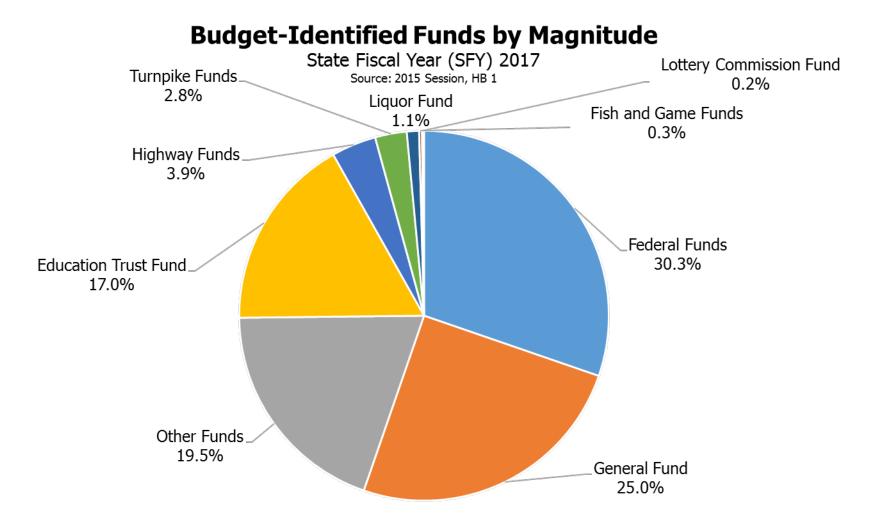
General Fund Change

Total Biennial Change

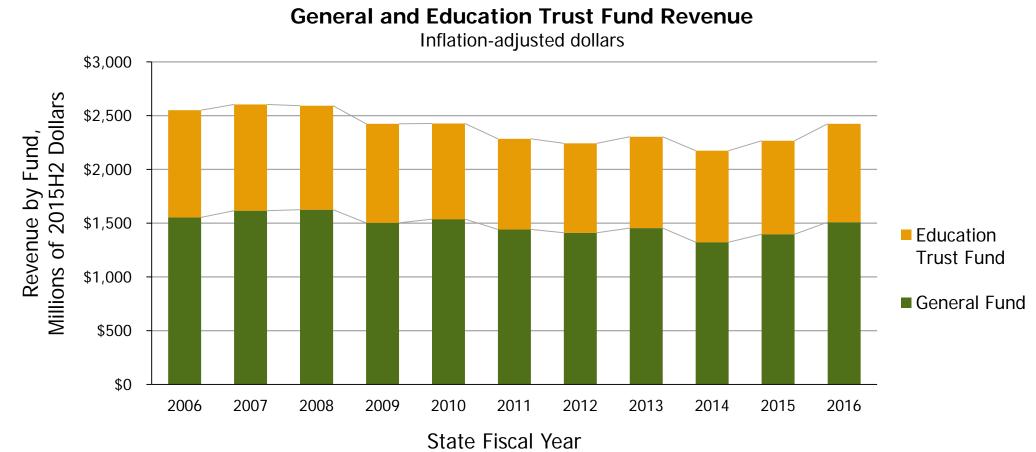

#### Looking Inside the Budget: General and Education Trust Funds



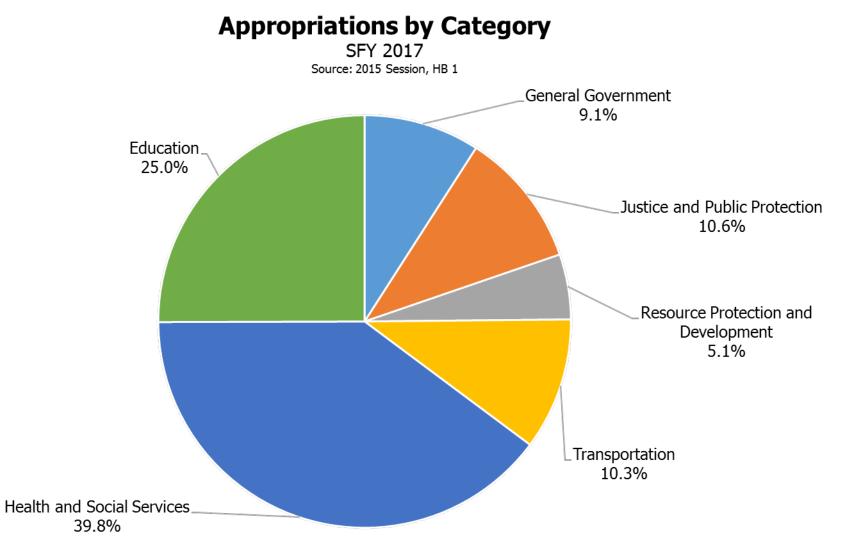

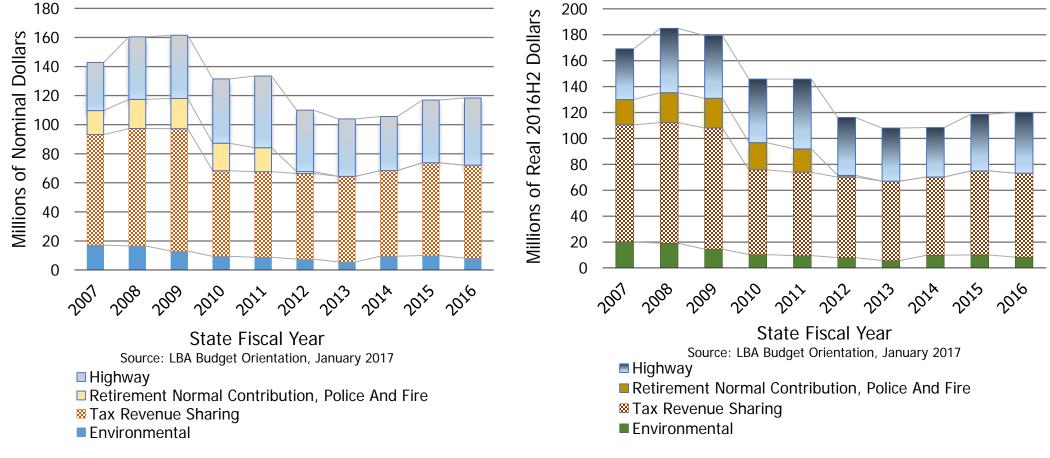

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### Looking Outside the Budget

- The Capital Budget
- The Ten Year Transportation Improvement Plan
- New Hampshire Health Protection Program
  - Nearly \$406 million in federal dollars for SFY 2016
  - Funded by federal transfers (95 percent in calendar year 2017, reducing over time) and contributions from hospitals
- Joint Legislative Fiscal Committee
  - Approves revenues from outside transfers, such as payment from lawsuits
  - Considers spending decisions during budget duration, such as new federal programs
  - > Approves additional revenue, usually about \$200 million per biennium
  - This biennium through November 2016, more than \$500 million approved
  - About \$5.6 million through January 2017 was new General Fund spending

# The Budget's Companion: House Bill 2

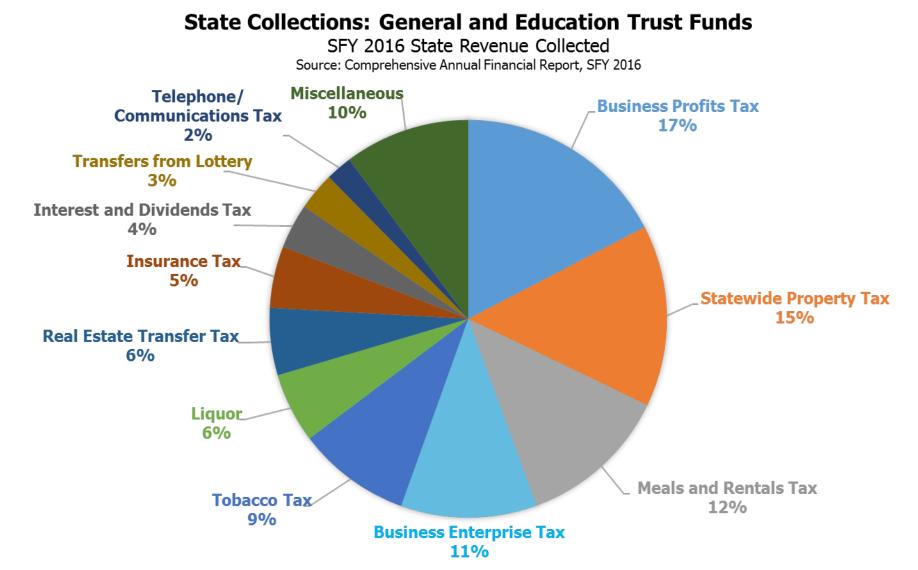
- Simply another bill, usually an omnibus bill
- Exists due to the New Hampshire Constitution, Part Second, Article 18-a:
  - \* "All sections of all budget bills before the general court shall contain only the operating and capital expenses for the executive, legislative and judicial branches of government..."
- Typically includes changes needed to execute new budget lines
- May include:
  - Changes to statute, such as new or altered programs
  - > Extensions of program suspensions
  - Provisions temporary by design
  - Additional appropriations or reductions
- Not to be confused with the "back" of House Bill 1, which may include changes to agency funding levels not reflected in line items
- "Back of the budget" changes in appropriations may happen in the back of House Bill 1, House Bill 2, or be assumed lapses in the surplus statement



# **Revenue: Where Does the Money Come From?**

- Federal programs, grants, and aid
- Agency income: fees for services, reserve accounts
- State taxes
  - Most commonly considered State taxes fund the General Fund and the Education Trust Fund
  - State taxes are least restricted source of revenue
  - No federal requirements or dedicated funds unless the Legislature opts to create dedicated funds
- Revenue Stabilization Reserve Account, "Rainy Day Fund" within the General Fund

The General Fund rates for both the Business Profits Tax and the Business Enterprise Tax were reduced to 6.70 percent and 0.22 percent, respectively, for calendar year 2017. <sup>2</sup> Tax receipts from vehicle rentals go to the Education Trust Fund while receipts from meals and rooms transactions go to the General Fund. Both are taxed at the same rate. <sup>3</sup> The Insurance Tax rate for certain types of insurance, including health and life insurance, is 2.00 percent. <sup>4</sup> Highway Fund revenues shown include both restricted and unrestricted revenues.

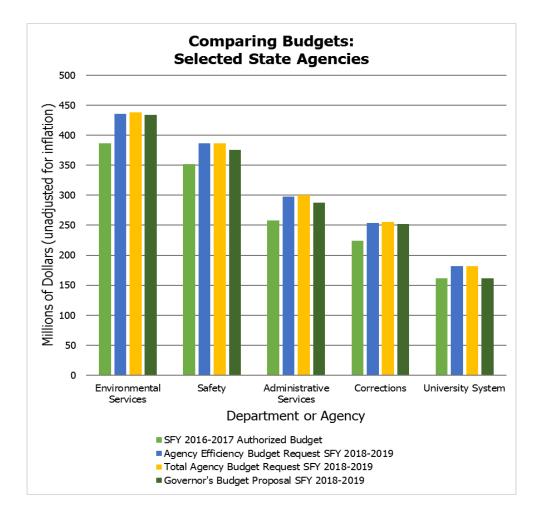

#### The Process: Agency Budget Process Changes

- First budget cycle with new "Efficiency budget" process
- Prior budget requests were "Maintenance" and "Change"
- Governor would often ask for an additional version of the budget with reductions or level changes
- Efficiency budget designed to have agency requests match expected revenue
- Agency receives targets, efficiency budget matches target, anything else "Additional Prioritized Needs"



#### The Process: The House and Senate

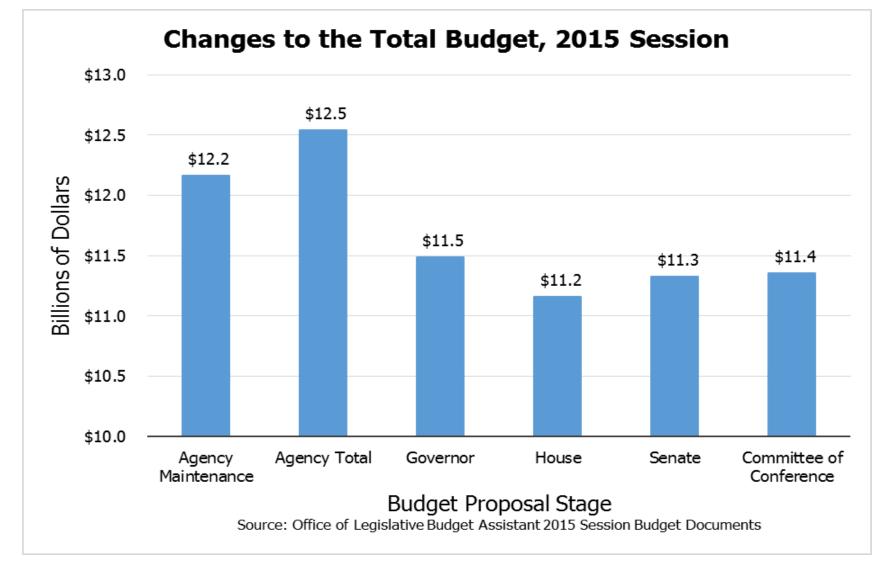
- House Finance Committee breaks into three Divisions, each handling a large, dedicated section of the budget
- Divisions vote on sections, bring budget together for full Finance vote (March 30)
- Goes to full House, can be amended there (April 6)
- Senate Finance then crafts its version, goes on to full Senate (June 1)
- Committee of Conference used to iron out disagreements (June 22)

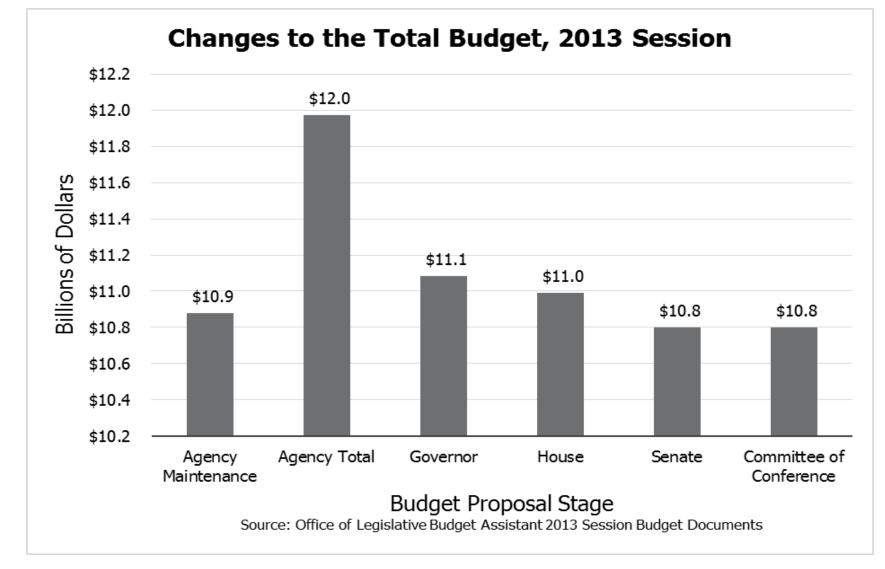

- Committee of Conference for Final Legislative Budget (June)

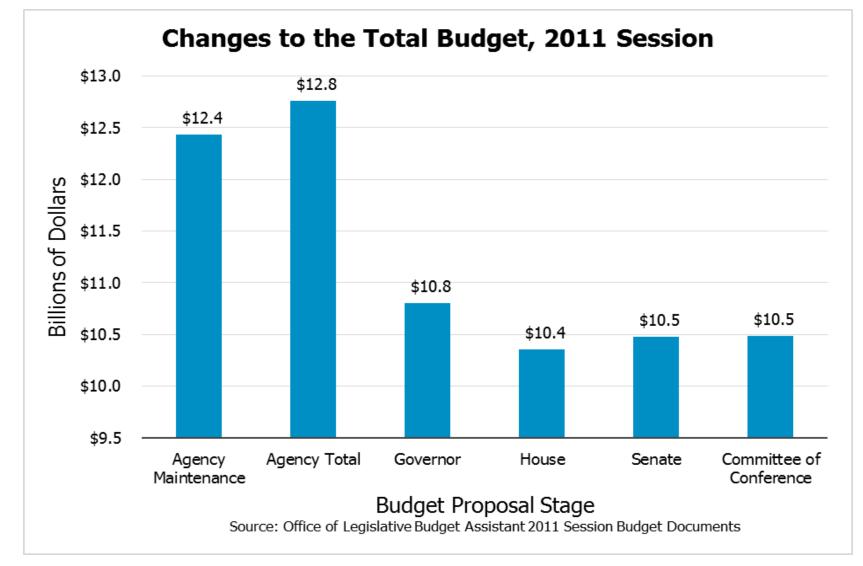
# **Projecting Revenue and Budgeting Patterns**



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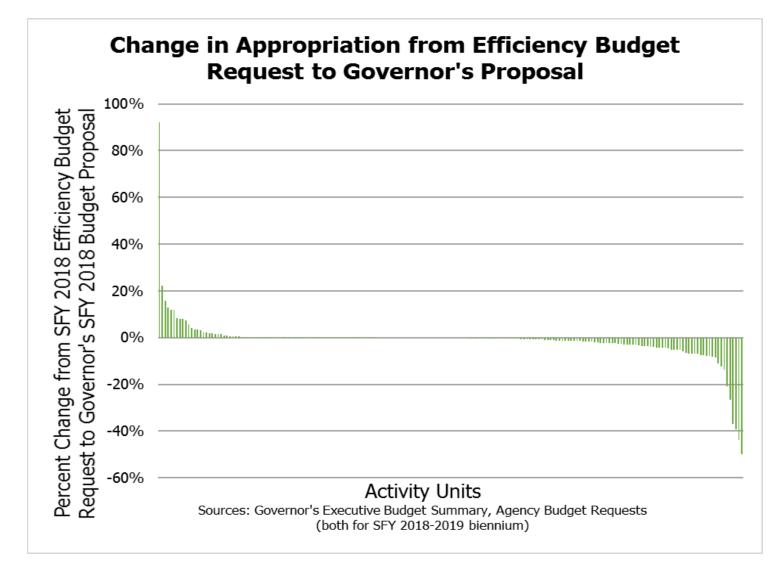

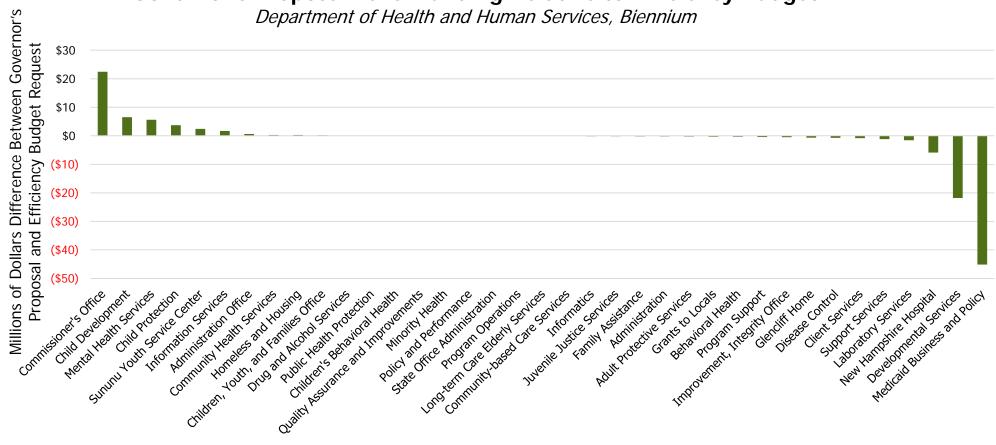

#### The Governor's Budget Proposal: Key Statistics

- Governor's proposed budget grows 7.3 percent for the biennium over the current operating budget as initially authorized
  - If passed as proposed, higher growth than comparable figures for last two biennial changes (5.1 percent and 3.0 percent, respectively)
- Governor's proposed SFY 2018 budget grows 4.5 percent from the SFY 2017 adjusted authorized budget
  - > 39.4 percent of Activity Units appropriated the same or less funding
- Relative to efficiency budget requests, 62.8 percent have the same or less appropriated to them
  - > Another 28.6 percent had increases of two percent or less over efficiency budget

#### The Governor's Budget Proposal: Major Initiatives in House Bill 2

- Full-day kindergarten
  - Sets up framework for sliding scale subsidy
  - Grants to every municipality based on property wealth, free- and reduced-price lunch eligibility percentage, and English-language learner percentage
- Infrastructure Revitalization Trust Fund
  - Estimated \$84.4 million for broad uses directed by Governor
- Department of Resources and Economic Development reorganization
  - Some components join the Department of Cultural Resources, form the new Department of Natural and Cultural Resources
  - New Department of Business and Economic Affairs created from remaining two divisions
- Consolidation of Department of Health and Human Services information technology operations under the Department of Information Technology

### **Continuing Questions: Federal Issues**

- American Health Care Act: Medicaid
  - Under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), match for Medicaid for New Hampshire is usually 50%-50%, and Medicaid expansion (the New Hampshire Health Protection Program) is 90%-10% after 2020
  - AHCA would remove 90%-10% match for new enrollees in expanded Medicaid programs starting in 2020, make all rates 50%-50% for those new or with coverage discontinuity
  - > AHCA has block grants for Medicaid based on a per capita cap with growth rate limit
  - Congressional Budget Office: Nationwide reductions in Medicaid payments to states total \$880 billion from 2017-2026
  - New Hampshire received approximately \$1 billion in federal Medicaid dollars in SFY 2016
  - Medicaid program (in total) was 29 percent of all State spending in SFY 2016
  - Additional AHCA component: Patient and State Stability Fund grants, \$80 billion of federal dollars nationwide from 2018-2026 with matching state funds likely to be used to offset costs to insurers for high-cost claims

# **Continuing Questions: Federal Issues**

- The President's proposed federal budget not the full federal budget, only discretionary spending proposals
  - Center on Budget and Policy Priorities: a roughly \$18 billion reduction in state and local funding in federal fiscal year 2018; non-Defense, Veterans, and Homeland Security discretionary spending falls about 15 percent
  - ➢ U.S. Department of Education funding reduced by 13.5 percent
  - Eliminates 21st Century Community Learning Centers funding, program targeted at high poverty school students (\$6.4 million in SFY 2017 State budget)
  - Reduces funding for certain teacher training programs
  - Eliminates Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, which funds the State Fuel Assistance Program (\$29.2 million in SFY 2017 State budget)
  - Reduces Women, Infants, and Children Nutrition Program (WIC) funding from \$6.4 billion to \$6.2 billion nationally (\$14.2 million in SFY 2017 State budget)
  - Weatherization Assistance Program eliminated (\$1.4 million in SFY 2017 State budget)

# **Continuing Questions: Federal Issues**

- The President's proposed federal budget not the full federal budget, only discretionary spending proposals (continued)
  - > Changes to Centers for Disease Control funding mechanisms, block grants to states
  - U.S. Department of Transportation funding reduced by 12.7 percent later transportation bills may be pending
  - U.S. Environmental Protection Agency funding reduced by 31.4 percent, State Revolving Funds for drinking water and wastewater supported, Categorical Grants dramatically reduced, regional efforts and programs also reduced or eliminated with "more than 50 EPA programs"
  - Reduces federal support for job training and employment service formula grants, helps states expand apprenticeships
  - Increased spending to combat drug trafficking and \$500 million above 2016 levels for opioid misuse prevention and treatment/recovery services State budget effects unknown
  - Eliminates Northern Border Regional Commission Coos, Grafton, Sullivan, and Carroll counties

#### **Continuing Questions: State Issues**

- Revenue, the surplus, and the economy
- Disproportionate Share (DSH) payments to hospitals for uncompensated care (~\$33 million)
- Business tax refund potential (\$173.4 million for SFY 2016)
- Concord Steam costs to State (~\$25 million)
- Any additional unbudgeted costs in SFY 2017 (Department of Health and Human Services commitments, etc.)
- Potential education funding changes
